## THE UNVEILING OF EYNSFORD WAR MEMORIAL

**15 July 1920:** At 7 o'clock Eynsford Brass Band played 'Jerusalem my happy home' to begin the service.

#### THE UNVEILING OF EYNSFORD WAR MEMORIAL IN 1920



Both Baptist minister Revd. John Felmingham and Eynsford Vicar Rev. T.F.J. Mummery led the service.

In an impressive ceremony, Sir William Hart Dyke unveiled the War Memorial.

Wreaths and crosses were laid.

A laurel wreath hung from the cross itself. (see left)

6 girls in white from Eynsford Paper Mill bore a huge anchor of everlasting flowers 'From their comrades at the Eynsford Paper Mills' which was laid within the railings. (see right)

'Fight the good fight' sung, ceremony ended with national anthem and last post.

Aberdeen granite Celtic cross on a base, with 22 names of the fallen on plinth.

Placed at the bottom of Bower Lane, where the German gun, a war trophy, had stood for some time.

It was surrounded by kerb and railings, and the area turfed.

## **EYNSFORD WAR MEMORIAL TABLET IN CHURCH UNVEILED IN 1920**

The dedication of the lych gate in memory of Elliott Downs Till was combined with the unveiling and dedication of the memorial to the servicemen who died in the Great War inside the Church.

After assembling to open the lych gate people went into church for the unveiling memorial ceremony in north chapel (now vestry).

Sir William Hart Dyke unveiled the memorial to the glory of God in grateful recollection of the valour and endurance unto death of the men who laid down their lives for their King and Country in the Great War.

## <u>THE LYCH GATE, ST. MARTIN'S</u> <u>CHURCH, EYNSFORD</u>

Architect: H. Battiscombe of Orpington

Builder: A. Knowles of Farningham

It cost £206 15s

The original stone memorial read: This lych gate / is built in memory of/ Elliott Downs Till / 1835-1917/ Resident and benefactor/ of this village/ founder of Arbor Day.

1961: The lych gate was rebuilt further back to create pavement in front of churchyard.

1998: The worn memorial stonewas replaced with the present onebut 'friend' replaced 'resident'.

# **EYNSFORD BAPTIST CHURCH MEMORIAL**

# Unveiled Friday 16 July 1920

The memorial tablet in white with black marble border is fixed on the wall of the vestibule inside Eynsford Baptist Church.

The names include members of the congregation and former pupils of Eynsford British School (for Non-Conformists), who served in the armed forces, as well as those who were killed.

Unlike other memorials, those commemorated include men from outside the village of Eynsford.
